2020 IMUA Scholarship

The City of Waterloo, in partnership with the Illinois Municipal Utilities Association (IMUA), is again offering a scholarship competition program for eligible high school seniors. Each eligible applicant is asked to submit an application and an essay of 500 words or less addressing their choice of one of three utility-related questions. The top four will receive a finalist certificate and a \$1,000 scholarship award check from IMUA.

Applicants must be high school seniors whose parents or legal guardians are residential customers of the City of Waterloo Municipal Utility. A Note From Reliable Sanitation:

Although Reliable Sanitation will continue to accept glass jars/bottles in the blue lid recycling bins, we are asking the public to take glass jars/bottles to the Monroe County Recycling Center (MCRC) to be processed, if possible. Currently when glass jars/ bottles are collected in recycling trucks, the glass breaks. Because of its small size, recycling "eye sensors" at the St. Louis Recycling Center cannot identify the broken glass as recyclable and it gets rejected in the recycling process. 100% of the glass jars/ bottles received at the MCRC is taken directly to "Strategic Glass" recycling facility.

The MCRC is located at 901 Illinois Avenue Rear (behind the Monroe County Annex building) and is open Monday through Friday from 8am-4pm and on Saturday from 8am-Noon. Thank you!

Census 101

2020 Once a decade, America comes together to participate in the decennial census, creating national awareness of the census and statistics. Beginning in March, you can complete the census online, by phone or by mail. Until then, here's what you need to know about the 2020 Census:

- **Everyone counts.** The census counts every person living in the U.S. once, only once, and in the right place.
- It's about fair representation. The results are used to reapportion the House of Representatives, determining how many seats each state gets.
- It's in the constitution. The U.S. Constitution requires a census every 10 years.
- Your data are confidential. Federal law protects your census responses. Your answers can only be used to produce statistics.
- It's about redistricting. State officials use the results to redraw the boundaries of their congressional and state legislative districts.
- It means \$675 billion. Census data determine how more than \$675 billion are spent, supporting our state, county and community's vital programs.
